



How do animals get what they need in a habitat? KEY

Animals and plants get everything they need from their habitat.

What do animals in the habitat that you looked at outside your home

or school need to live? Answers will vary, but should contain examples of food, water, and shelter. Food: plants, seeds, grass, etc.

Water: puddles, stream, etc.

Shelter: trees, underground, in the grass, under dead leaves

Teacher notes: Additional discussion could include categorizing student responses into examples of food and shelter.

Animals use parts of their bodies to help them get what they need from their habitat.

Pick one animal that you saw in this habitat.

1. Draw the animal.

2. Circle and write the name for the parts of the body this animal uses to get what it needs.

Answers will vary.



When I am hungry, I use my hands to peel a banana or open the refrigerator. Also, I use my feet to walk to my house. I push the button on the drinking fountain with my thumb to get water.
